I have a very big God

During a listener and prayer group run by one of the few evangelical churches in Yopougon, Côte d'Ivoire, Mariam* burst into a song and dance joined by the whole group of women. The song declares, "I have a very big God."

Mariam migrated from one of the areas outside Abidjan. Coming from a poverty-stricken home, her mother wanted her daughter to have a better life that included education. Mariam shares:

My auntie took me from my parent's home at an early age and promised to take me to school, but after a few years she made me stop. She mistreated me and sexually abused me, but no one listened when I complained and shared my hurt and pain. I was not



given food or even clothes at times. I told myself that if I ever have a child, I will treat them well. I ran away and became a domestic worker, but my life was very bitter and sad.

Then I met a man who I thought loved me, and I got pregnant. The man disappeared, but I resolved to raise my child. At that time, I did not know God. I wanted my son to have a childhood different from my own. Thinking that spoiling my child would be showing love, I gave him everything he asked for and never once lifted my voice.

One day I met a pastor's wife who invited me to her women's meeting. There they listened to the Women of Hope radio program, talked about women's issues and spoke

of a Jesus who loves them. I wanted to experience that love and soon received Jesus' salvation and became a regular attendee of this group.

*While listening to a Women of Hope program on parenting, I was shocked to learn that I was doing it **all wrong**. After praying for forgiveness from God, I asked him to guide me to raise this son and show him true love. I pray that my son grows up to be a servant of God and a good citizen. I know I have a big God who loves me and hears my prayers. I know that man plans, but God directs the steps.*

Amid turmoil, God is still at work

Although Côte d'Ivoire has been relatively stable since recovering from its own civil war in 2011, for the last several years the overall subregion has encountered complex and protracted crises: brutal violence, political instability, weak governance, chronic poverty and internally displaced communities. Daily survival is extremely challenging for the 63.5 million who live in the region.

Many displaced people from this subregion, particularly women and children, are being absorbed into Côte d'Ivoire's population—particularly in Abidjan, its economic center. We praise God that the TWR Women of Hope ministry is widespread within Abidjan and has recently extended to the nation's capital, Yamoussoukro.

Recently Macy Domingo, the first national coordinator for Côte d'Ivoire, shared about the ministry's humble beginnings.

“We had nothing - no place to meet and no office,” Domingo says. “We only had a passion to serve the Lord believing that he answers prayer. After vigilant and persistent prayer, God opened an opportunity - two prayer groups were established, and the ministry began.”

Since 2007 the ministry has grown to have several prayer groups and listener groups on different platforms with participants spanning the generations.

Women meet to pray in person across the city of Abidjan as well as through social media platforms. On Facebook there are over a thousand members distributed across the country. Others are on WhatsApp, which covers a wider area of the nation.

TWR Women of Hope Côte d'Ivoire continues to reach women who have faced trauma, displacement, isolation and abuse.

Victoire Fayé, the current Côte d'Ivoire national coordinator, says, “It is our prayer that we can continue to serve women like Salamata, from whom we received this message: ‘When the coup happened in my country, which borders Côte d'Ivoire, I had to flee. I have found you on Facebook and have been following your teachings, which have strengthened me to face yet another day. I have invited other relatives and friends who are also displaced to engage with you via Facebook or on WhatsApp. I also share with some who are not on Facebook through short text messages.’”

Each year, the Women of Hope team in Côte d'Ivoire produces weekly programs that are aired on local radio stations and distributed through Facebook and to listening groups. Fayé asks you to pray for this Côte d'Ivoire ministry as they “bring God to women who are in the middle of turmoil.”

Celebrate the most precious gifts of all

I can hardly believe another year has come and gone! What does this season look like in your country? In Brazil, our streets, malls and shops look very festive, reminding all of us that Christmas is just around the corner. There is a lot of excitement about the upcoming celebrations. And one of the main focuses is to find the ideal gift for your loved ones, which is not always an easy task. Now, if that mission is accomplished successfully, seeing the happy look on the faces of the ones we love as they receive the “perfect” gift is just priceless.

Speaking of which, what would you consider a perfect gift? I realize the answer depends on the season of life we are in. The kinds of things we wished for as a child are very different from the ones we wish for as adults. As we mature, we may still have a list of things we would love to have, yet we begin to understand that some of the most precious gifts in life are not for sale in retail shops. Good health, nature, friends, a loving family are just a few examples.

In some countries, people put their presents under the Christmas tree. Wouldn’t it be special, though, to place a jar containing a list of those more precious gifts under our Christmas tree and then to read the list aloud on Christmas Day? I think it’d bring even more joy to our celebration.

Taking the time to list those presents always fills my heart with thanksgiving and hope, both in my personal life and the life of the ministry. The Lord has given our TWR Women of Hope teams around the globe the privilege of participating with him in his work by bringing hope to women through our ministry. Our team in Côte d’Ivoire shared about one of these precious gifts: “A woman visiting our village was very hostile to the gospel; she pushed away all those who approached her to present the gospel. But she has just given her life to Christ after listening to the *Women of Hope* broadcasts.”

This woman reminds me of Matthew 16:13, in which Jesus asks his disciples, “Who do people say that the Son of Man is?” He got different answers. It seems to me this woman was getting distinct answers about Jesus’ identity. She may have perceived him through the lenses of those who see Jesus as a distant and scary God. But when she invited him into her life, she began to see him in a whole new light.

Today she joins Peter in his most beautiful declaration ever: “Simon Peter answered him, ‘Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe and to know that you are the Holy One of God’ (John 6:68-69). Nothing compares to the joy of knowing Jesus as our Savior and God. He is our indescribable gift. In him we have true hope for now and evermore.

I wish you and your loved ones a beautiful and meaningful Christmastime. I pray that the joy of the season lasts throughout the upcoming year as you abide in him.

Have you heard the call? God calls us to go into the world to bring his message of salvation to all people. We do not share Jesus with others out of guilt or to feel proud about having accomplished something for God. Rather, we do it out of our love for Christ. Humbly we go as his servants, in his power and with his message, resting in the fact that the results are up to God, for only his power can change a person's heart.

And heart change often begins with prayer. There are specific things that I pray when I bring the name of an unbeliever I am concerned about before God. I love to pray God's Word back to him because then I know that I am praying according to his will.

As I share these ideas with you, think of one person in your life that you desire to come to salvation through Jesus.

Hold this individual before God right now, and join me in praying that they will experience:

- The fear of the Lord - for it is the beginning of wisdom (Prov. 9:10).
- The Holy Spirit convicting them of sin, of righteousness and of the reality that judgment is coming (John 16:8).
- The Father drawing them to himself (John 6:44).
- Their eyes and ears being opened to hear and see God. Pray for the removal of the pain and strongholds that have kept them from accurately seeing God and understanding the gospel message (2 Cor. 4:4).
- The gospel being shared with them in a way that they can understand. (Neh. 8:8; 1 Cor. 14:9).
- The seed of the gospel not being stolen by the enemy but instead taking root and bearing fruit in their lives (Matt. 13:19-23).
- Receiving Jesus Christ as their Savior and Lord (Rom. 10:9).
- Becoming a part of a Bible-preaching church that embraces them and discipled them to maturity (Matt. 28:19; Heb. 10:24-25).

- Sharing their testimony and the gospel message with those around them and, in turn, discipling others (2 Tim. 2:2).

Let's get very practical. Let's say that you want to share Jesus with your neighbors or co-workers. It is always best to saturate the relationships with prayer. God desires for us to have his heart of compassion and love for others. So through prayer, God can do a work in your heart as well as those who don't yet know him.

Because it is best to share the gospel in relationship, we need to be intentional in creating friendships with nonbelievers. As you build trust over time within these relationships, ask God to open up opportunities to have spiritual conversations with them. Ask God to give you discernment into their hearts. What do they believe? What are their fears? What do they desire? Where are they placing their hope? What lies are they believing?

These spiritual conversations may or may not turn into gospel conversations, but they are important so that you can understand who they are. These conversations are key for later as you explain the gospel in a way that is relevant to their lives.

It is also helpful to listen carefully in your conversations with others, looking and listening for their felt needs so that you can pray specifically for them. God may even give you an opportunity where you can ask them, "Can I pray for you?"

Now, thinking of the people with whom you wish to share Jesus, do you want to develop these important relationships? Here are some ideas: Organize a neighborhood gathering, invite people over for a meal or look for other opportunities to "do life" together. This is intentional Christianity.

In humility, we are asking God to give us the opportunity to express to others our love for them and to share with them the most valuable and important thing in our lives. This is not manipulating people. Out of genuine love, we desire their friendship and to have community with them because we see them as valuable.

Is God calling you to develop a friendship with someone? How could you love and serve that individual and show that you care? What concrete steps could you intentionally take to develop community with nonbelievers?
